

## Smart Start for Babies 3 month-old

YOUR 3 MONTH—OLD BA	BY ACTIVITIES
Physical  Can stretch arms & legs all the way of a Can roll over one way  Starts to use hands & eyes in coording the Holds head up to search  Can hold rattle longer  Swipes at objects with arms  Raises head and chest when on tumn Kicks & straightens legs while on back Opens & shuts hands  May reach for an object  Grasp & shakes hand toys  Brings both hands together  Follows moving objects	on his tummy for 10 minutes several times a day  To develop hand and finger muscles give your baby a rattle to hold

<ul> <li>Can stand up with help</li> <li>Rolls over one way</li> <li>Lifts head 90 degrees, holds head stead</li> <li>On stomach, baby raises his/her chest sported by arms</li> <li>Sits with arms propped</li> <li>Reaches for objects</li> <li>Can follow a moving object</li> <li>Explores object with his/her mouth</li> <li>Kicks legs purposefully</li> <li>Holds a rattle</li> <li>Puts things in his/her mouth</li> <li>May be able to sit without support</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Use a cradle gym to encourage your baby to reach out and touch items</li> <li>When your baby is on his/her stomach, sit and</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Language</li> <li>Changes shape of mouth to change so</li> <li>Sputters</li> <li>Babbles and amuses self with noises such muh-muh, bah-bah</li> <li>Squeals in delight</li> <li>Says "ah-goo" or similar vowel-consonations</li> <li>Makes wet razzing sound</li> </ul>	and talk about what you see  Read your baby simple books naming objects
<ul> <li>Thinking</li> <li>Baby forms mental images of what they pect</li> <li>Is aware that people and things have lo (Dada)</li> <li>Starts to explore things by tasting them</li> <li>Follows objects with his/her eyes</li> </ul>	at a few pictures and talking about them
<ul> <li>Social</li> <li>Laughs hard when tickled</li> <li>Greets caregiver</li> <li>Moves arms to signal 'pick me up"</li> <li>Likes social interaction</li> <li>Communicates pain, fear, loneliness an comfort through crying</li> <li>Responds to a rattle or bell</li> <li>Turns in direction of a voice</li> </ul>	Social Activities  Talk to your baby Play Peek-a-boo Gently tickle your baby  d dis-

## Smart Start for Babies 5-6 month-old

YOUR 5-6 MONTH—OLD BABY		ACTIVITIES
•	Physical Grabs toes Can wiggle forward on the floor Reaches with a good aim Transfers objects from hand to hand Can see across the room	<ul> <li>Physical Activities</li> <li>Give baby practice holding things by putting soft, easy-to-grasp toys in his hands</li> <li>When baby is on the floor put toys by his sides within reach to encourage him to turn his body to get them</li> </ul>
•	May be able to pull up to standing position May stand holding onto something May rake with fingers a tiny object and pick it up in fist May start to rock back and forth on his hands and knees to get ready to crawl	<ul> <li>Play pat-a-cake</li> <li>Place baby in different positions to help develop new skills like rolling, creeping, and crawling</li> <li>Make sure he gets time to play on both his stomach and his back</li> </ul>
•	Language  Tries to mimic sounds  May babble combining vowels and consonants, ga-ga-ga, ba-ba-ba, ma-ma-ma, dada-da	<ul> <li>Language Activities</li> <li>Read your baby simple books naming objects</li> <li>Have conversations with your baby</li> <li>Tell stories to your baby</li> </ul>
•	Thinking Shows interest in colors Pushes away disliked actions (Wiping nose) Displays expression and decision-making Pays attention to small objects Experiments with the concept of cause and effect	<ul> <li>Thinking Activities</li> <li>Go shopping. The faces, sounds and colors provide perfect baby entertainment</li> <li>Talk to baby often. When you announce "I'm going to turn the lights on now" you're teaching cause and effect</li> </ul>
•	Social  Turns head toward speaker  Watches your mouth movements  Baby is aware of strange people and situations  Imitates other babies	<ul> <li>Social Activities</li> <li>Stand on either side or behind your baby and speak to them. Watch for their head movement towards your voice.</li> <li>Speak to your baby while directly in front of him/her so your baby can see your mouth</li> </ul>
