## Smart Start for Toddlers 9 month-old

YOUR 9 MONTH—OLD BABY	ACTIVITIES
<ul> <li>Physical</li> <li>Reaches for toys</li> <li>Becomes interested in grabbing the spoon during feeding</li> <li>Goes from tummy to sitting by self</li> <li>Picks up tiny objects</li> <li>Sits unsupported</li> <li>Baby will begin mastering the art or crawling.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Physical Activities</li> <li>Holding baby's hands in the air, let him walk between your legs</li> <li>Encourage your child to explore holding their spoon and feeding themselves.</li> <li>Give your child easy to eat foods like Cheerios or small, soft, cooked pieces of vegetables to eat with their fingers.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Language</li> <li>Babbles more than one syllable</li> <li>Mimics sounds like tongue clicking, raspberries, and coughs.</li> </ul>	Language Activities  • Encourage mimicking.
<ul> <li>Thinking</li> <li>Drops objects and then looks for them.</li> <li>Wants to explore new objects by touching.</li> </ul>	Thinking Activities  Even if it seems like your baby repeatedly drops toys off his high chair, give him items to drop them let him search for them, then pick them up  Switch your baby's highchair to the other side of the table. You'll challenge his memory of where things are placed
Begins to identify self in a mirror's reflection     Plays simply games.	Social Activities  Have your baby stare at himself in the mirror.  Play simple games like Peek-A-Boo.

## Smart Start for Toddlers 10 month-old

YOUR 10 MONTH—OLD BABY	ACTIVITIES
<ul> <li>Physical</li> <li>Transfers objects from hand to hand.</li> <li>Stands holding on to someone.</li> <li>Pulls themselves up to standing position</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Physical Activities</li> <li>Give your baby small toys to explore that are easy for them to hold on to.</li> <li>Hold your baby's hands in standing position and encourage their first steps.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Language</li> <li>Says "ma-ma" and "da-da" discriminately.</li> <li>May begin to say simple, familiar words.</li> </ul>	Language Activities  • Expand upon your baby's words. If your baby says "dog" say "Yes, that is our dog Rusty."
Thinking  • Understands the concept of object permanence.	Thinking Activities  • Play hide and seek. Hide a favorite toy under a blanket and have your baby "find" it.
<ul> <li>Social</li> <li>Gets upset when toy is removed.</li> <li>Exhibits moods with varied sounds and body movements.</li> <li>May be shy or afraid of strangers.</li> <li>Raises their arms when they want picked up.</li> </ul>	Social Activities  • Give your baby the words for their feelings. "You are feeling angry right now because you can't have the telephone."

## Smart Start for Toddlers 11-12 month-old

YOUR 11-12 MONTH—OLD BABY	ACTIVITIES
<ul> <li>Physical</li> <li>Claps hands</li> <li>Begins walking while holding on to someone or furniture.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Physical Activities</li> <li>Your baby will need the support of two hands or furniture when walking.</li> <li>Sing rhymes and songs that involve clapping (Pat-A-Cake)</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Language</li> <li>Understands "no"</li> <li>Shakes head for "no"</li> <li>Points to things they want.</li> <li>May begin to say simple, familiar words.</li> </ul>	Language Activities  • When your baby points to things they want expand their vocabulary by identifying the object with words. ("You want your milk.")
Thinking  • Understands and responds to simple commands	Thinking Activities  • Say simply commands to your baby. ("Give that to mommy" or "Come here.")
<ul> <li>Social</li> <li>Waves bye bye.</li> <li>Acts frustrated when restricted (being held too long, in high chair too long).</li> <li>Becomes excited when a task is mastered.</li> <li>Enjoys mimicking.</li> </ul>	Social Activities  • Encourage your child to wave bye to friends and family.
